STUDENT'S GUIDE

Discussion Questions: "Narrow and Wide Gates"

The Narrow (Strait) and Wide Gates is an excellent parable described by Jesus, comparing the choice of two different paths everyone will eventually make. The story begins with someone from the crowd asking Jesus a distressing question.

1) The Narrow and Wide Gates. (Read the verses outlined in blue: First read Luke 13:22-24, then Matthew 7:13-14). Someone asks Jesus "are there only a few people who will be saved?" What is His response?

2) Strive to enter. What does it mean when Jesus states in Luke 13:24 to "Strive to enter?"

3) The Strait Gate: Why is the gate narrow?

4) Compare Matthew's version. Finish the scripture Matthew 7:14: "Difficult is the way (or pathway) which leads to life, and

Explain why only a few find it.

| 7) | What is the wide or broad gate? |

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| 11 | I am the door. (Read the verses outlined in purple: John 10:7-9) What or who is the 'gate' being referred to? |
| 12 | Who are the sheep? |
| 13 | The master of the house. (Read the verses outlined in black: Luke 13:25-27) Who is the master of the house? |
| 14 | What is the master's reply when someone knocks at the door? |
| 15 | Why does Jesus say in Luke 13:25-27 "I tell you I do not know you, where you are from. Depart from Me, all you workers of iniquity." |
| 16 | Controversial question. Read Matthew 7:7-8. How is this different from someone knocking on Jesus' door and Him opening it, compared to knocking on the master's door and Jesus' response, I do not know you?" |
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| 17 | I Am the Way (Read the verses outlined in green: John 14:6) What does it mean when Jesus says, "I am the way." |
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
